How To Vote

All Australian citizens over the age of 18 who are enrolled to vote, elect people to represent them in the two houses of the Commonwealth Parliament – the Senate and the House of Representatives.

How to make your vote count (fact sheet)

The House of Representatives

Australia is divided into areas called electoral divisions. Voters in each electoral division cast a vote to elect one person (a Member of Parliament) to represent them in the House of Representatives.

- How to vote for a Member of the House of Representatives
- Practise voting for the House of Representatives

The Senate

Voters in each state and territory elect Senators to represent them in the Senate. States have 12 Senators and the Australian Capital Territory and the Northern Territory each have 2 Senators.

- Practise voting for the Senate

These practise voting tools have been developed to explain the easiest way to make sure your vote will count in federal election events. It is a great education / training tool to teach people with intellectual disability how to vote.

NDIS & Specialist Disability Accommodation

The NDIA has published the Specialist Disability Accommodation (SDA) Decision Paper on Pricing and Payments which sets out the benchmark pricing and payments approach for funding of the land and built elements of SDA under the NDIS.

SDA refers to specialist housing solutions for participants that assists with the delivery of supports which cater for their significant functional impairment and/or very high support needs.

SDA is not intended for all people with a disability. The Agency will work closely with states and territories, housing authorities, and communities to identify opportunities to address the broader accessible and affordable housing challenges for people with disability.

Participants that require access to SDA will have funding included in their plan to cover the capital cost of providing this accommodation. Participants will also make a reasonable rental contribution towards their accommodation.

The release of the Decision Paper is an important step in the development of a market that meets the SDA needs of NDIS participants. The Paper follows the Agency's publication of draft pricing in its SDA Position Paper on April 1, 2016. The approach incorporates comments and feedback from extensive consultations around Australia with participants, families, housing providers, financiers and other stakeholders.

The pricing approach includes an SDA innovation category which will be funded through SDA as the NDIS builds an evidence base of what constitutes innovation in SDA design and how this affects overall support combinations and outcomes.

The NDIS approach to SDA will ensure continuity of support and accommodation arrangements for participants who are currently living in SDA.

SDA funding is not to cover support costs, which are assessed and funded separately by the NDIS.

To get young people out of nursing homes, we need to back up the NDIS with housing – here's how

Young people with disability living in nursing homes are one of the most marginalised and isolated groups of people in our society. More than half of them, 53%, receive a visit from a friend less than once a year. They generally lead impoverished lives, characterised by loneliness and boredom.

These problems affect more than <u>6,200</u> people under the age of 65 who are stuck in nursing homes. Another 200 people under 50 are admitted to nursing homes each year. This is a serious social issue that can and must be fixed.

People under 65 living in nursing homes are eligible for funding through the <u>National Disability Insurance</u> <u>Scheme</u> (NDIS). The NDIS will provide crucial funding for the support that these people need to live in the community.

However, the NDIS cannot on its own stop the inappropriate placement of young people in nursing homes. More accessible and affordable housing needs to be built.

Increasing the scale and range of housing

Significant increases in the scale and range of housing for people with disability are urgently needed. This article reveals some options.

The NSW NDIS and Mental Health Analysis Partnership Project

Insights from the first two years of the NDIS rollout in the Hunter region.

The NSW Mental Health Commission has partnered with the Mental Health Coordinating Council (MHCC) - the NSW peak group for community-managed organisations providing mental health support - to place a project officer to work at the Hunter NDIS site since July 2013.

The NSW NDIS and Mental Health Analysis Partnership Project was intended to provide early insights into operational aspects of the NDIS in relation to people with psychosocial disability, which is a frequent consequence of severe and persistent mental illness.

Not-for-Profit Finance & Governance Insights

This report offers insight into Australia's \$107 billion not-for-profit sector. It has revealed a massive undercurrent of pressures driving a fundamental shift in the sector that powers Australia's communities. This report, which received 845 submissions from senior representatives of Australian not-for-profit groups, was released in December 2015. Our Community's Institute of Community Directors Australia.

- 56% of respondents agreed that most board members had a good understanding of their organisation's finances. Only 16% believe all members of the board have a good understanding of the finances of the organisation they are governing.
- 53% of community groups have difficulty recruiting treasurers to oversee their finances, with 5% of not-for-profits paying their treasurer (traditionally an honorary position), rising to 11% for larger not-for-profits.
- 31% of organisations believe they don't need any formal risk management processes because they trust their staff. Nonetheless, 79% of frauds reported through the survey were perpetrated by trusted insiders.
- 63% of large not-for-profits rely primarily on government contracts and grants for funding, while almost one in five now source the largest part of their income from trading activities or service provision.
- 29% of respondents say their organisation isn't doing enough to protect against cyber-crime, while a further 39% aren't sure if their organisation is doing enough.
- **85% say it's becoming harder to find consistent and regular funding**. But despite the challenges, not-for-profits continue to expand their operations.
- 20% of organisations say the past year has been the most challenging year for raising revenue in their history.
- 15% of respondents said they expected to take part in a merger in the next 12 months.
- 56% of organisations are feeling the pressure to reduce their overheads. Half of those say the most pressure is coming from their own board.

Home modifications reduce reliance on care: study

Australian-first research has shown that modifying the home of a community care client can reduce the need for care by an average of 42 per cent and lead to a 40 per cent improvement in a person's quality of life.

Some 157 older people and people with a disability were studied as part of the research, which has demonstrated the significant role home modifications can play in not only supporting but substituting for care, and in a restorative approach.

The findings showed that at a policy level housing, health and care policy needed to be considered together and were interdependent, as changes to people's housing have a significant impact on people's health and care needs, she said.

Health status and risk factors of Australians with disability 2007-08 and 2011-12

This report examines how health-related factors affect the health status of Australians with disability at the national population level.

- In 2011-12, half (51%) of people aged 15-64 with severe or profound disability reported poor or fair health, compared with 6% for those without disability.
- Half (50%) of people aged under 65 with severe or profound disability had mental health conditions, compared with 8% for those without disability.
- Higher proportions of people aged 15-64 with severe or profound disability compared with those without disability were obese (43% versus 25%), doing no physical exercise (46% versus 31%), daily smokers (31% versus 15%) and having a very high level of psychological distress (22% versus 1%).

Medication and Mental Illness: Perspectives

The development of *Mediction and Mental Illness: Perspectives* was undertaken to explore the challenges and opportunities presented by medication as a treatment for mental illness. Specifically, the Mental Health Commission of NSW sought to elevate the voice of the consumers and carers and enable them to advocate for change. The Commission published an <u>issues paper</u> on medication and mental illness in November 2014 and invited submissions on the topic. It also conducted focused consultations with special interest groups in February – March 2015. Over 200 submissions were received and the resulting analysis uncovered six key themes, around which the paper is structured:

- 1. Medication is one treatment option: people want medication to be prescribed in conjunction with non-pharmacological therapies.
- 2. Health systems, practices and recovery: prescribing takes place within a system that currently experiences challenges
- Taking medication: consumers and carers said that their concerns about medications were either ignored or dismissed.
- 4. Medication costs: the high cost of medication can be a barrier to access
- 5. Medication side effects: the unwanted effects of medication can range from mild and bearable to permanent and sometimes life threatening.
- 6. Medication supported my recovery: medication can assist a return to regular routine.

The Commission's <u>Pharmacotherapy in Mental Health Advisory Group (PAG)</u> was instrumental in shaping this project's focus and methodology.

Medication and Mental Illness: Perspectives

Policies & Guidelines

Clinical Practice Guidelines and Principles of Care for People with Dementia.

Dementia is a clinical syndrome which can be caused by a number of underlying diseases (including Alzheimer's disease). Dementia can affect memory, thinking, behaviour, communication and ability to perform activities of daily living. People with dementia describe the condition as disabling, challenging, life changing and stressful. The impact of dementia on carers is significant and caring for a person with dementia may lead to poor health, depression and social isolation. Approximately nine per cent of Australians aged 65 and over have a diagnosis of dementia; in people aged 85 years and older this figure rises to 30 per cent. As Australia's population ages, the number of people with dementia is expected to increase.

The guidelines (recommendations) on pages 7-20 were approved by the Chief Executive Officer of the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) on 1 February 2016 under section 14A of the National Health and Medical Research Council Act 1992. In approving the guidelines (recommendations), NHMRC considers that they meet the NHMRC standard for clinical practice guidelines. This approval is valid for a period of five years. NHMRC is satisfied that the guidelines (recommendations) are systematically derived, based on the identification and synthesis of the best available scientific evidence, and developed for health professionals practising in an Australian health care setting. Physical health and mental well-being of people with mental illness: An Evidence Guide

This evidence guide pulls together what we can most confidently say about the links between physical health and mental illness and its treatments, and about what we could do better. It draws on the most robust research and includes examples of successful approaches from NSW, Australia and overseas.

Despite ongoing attempts to address the poor physical health of mental health consumers, much remains to be achieved. This document aims to provide a summary of the evidence regarding what measures need to be taken to improve the physical health of people living with severe mental illness.

The guide discusses the evidence for comprehensive lifestyle interventions to help improve the physical health of consumers living with severe mental illness. It provides evidence from proven strategies to improve access to physical health services, as well as health promotion, prevention and early intervention for people with coexisting mental and physical health issues. Although there are significant physical health issues in people with mental health issues, (e.g. anxiety, depression, eating disorders and traumatic stress disorders) this guide focuses only on the physical health of those with severe mental illness, specifically bipolar affective disorder, schizophrenia and other psychotic illnesses.

Australian and international literature, including clinical trials, systematic reviews and position statements, in addition to grey literature (unpublished academic literature) was reviewed to gather evidence and identify best practice initiatives, frameworks, policies and models. Evidence was collated and assessed to identify not only the currency of evidence but also its applicability, feasibility and potential for practical implementation in NSW.

Closure of Marsden Centre

The last residents of Marsden Centre moved into their new community homes on 1 April 2016.

Marsden Hospital was officially opened in 1969. with accommodation for 300 children with intellectual disability, a dedicated school, a sheltered workshop, nurses accommodation and an administration building, all on farmland at Westmead owned by the Parramatta Psychiatric Centre.

The unsuitability of large residential centres (LRCs) as housing for people with disability was recognised soon after, and by the 1990s, politicians were vowing to close them, although little happened at the time.

Disability Services Minister John Ajaka has stated many times his intention to close all of the LRCs, and the closure of Marsden gives credence to his words. He has faced down pockets of strident opposition from groups with vested interests in the continuance of these institutions that have been shown to be detrimental to the welfare of people with disability.

Plans are well under way to complete this work before the full roll out of the NDIS in 2018.

Oral Care for People with Disability - Resource for Disability Support Workers

Did you know **poor oral hygiene** impacts on the health and wellbeing of us all in unexpected ways such as creating heart disease? Studies show that **people with disability** experience a higher level of oral health problems sometimes creating behaviours of concern.
