# NDIS Joint Standing Committee announces Inquiry into the provision of services under the NDIS for people with psychosocial disabilities related to a mental health condition

The Joint Standing Committee on the NDIS as part of the role in conducting an inquiry into the implementation, performance and governance of the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS), the committee will inquire into the provision of services under the NDIS for people with psychosocial disabilities related to a mental health condition.

The terms of reference for the inquiry are as follows:

- 1. That the joint committee inquire into and report on the provision of services under the NDIS for people with psychosocial disabilities related to a mental health condition, with particular reference to:
  - a. the eligibility criteria for the NDIS for people with a psychosocial disability;

- b. the transition to the NDIS of all current long and short term mental health Commonwealth Government funded services, including the Personal Helpers and Mentors services (PHaMs) and Partners in Recovery (PIR) programs, and in particular;
  - i. whether these services will continue to be provided for people deemed ineligible for the NDIS;
- c. the transition to the NDIS of all current long and short term mental health state and territory government funded services, and in particular;
  - i. whether these services will continue to be provided for people deemed ineligible for the NDIS:
- d. the scope and level of funding for mental health services under the Information, Linkages and Capacity building framework;
- e. the planning process for people with a psychosocial disability, and the role of primary health networks in that process;
- f. whether spending on services for people with a psychosocial disability is in line with projections;
- g. the role and extent of outreach services to identify potential NDIS participants with a psychosocial disability; and
- the provision, and continuation of services for NDIS participants in receipt of forensic disability services;
- i. any related matter.
- 2. That the joint committee report by 22 June 2017.

#### **Submissions**

The committee calls for submissions on the provision of services under the NDIS for people with psychosocial disabilities related to a mental health condition.

The due date for submissions is 27 February 2017.

## **New NDIS Board Members and Chair**

The Board overseeing the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) will be expanded from 1 January 2017 to ensure it has the disability service, financial management, corporate governance and insurance-based expertise needed to guide the \$22 billion scheme through its critical three year expansion to 2019-20.

The new Chair of the National Disability Insurance Agency Board, Dr Helen Nugent AO, is an experienced Chairperson with a history of very senior roles in the financial services, health, energy, resources, education and arts sectors.

She will be supported by four continuing Board members and seven new members, to combine high level experience in governance, finance, risk management and insurance; together with lived experience of disability to provide confidence to the sector that the NDIS will be expertly overseen to deliver for people with disability, their families and carers.

- Mr Jim Minto: A director of the Australian Finance Group and Dai-ichi Life Asia-Pacific with extensive insurance experience.
- Mr Paul O'Sullivan: Current Chair of Singtel Optus and board member of Healthscope Limited and the St George and Sutherland Medical Research Foundation.
- Ms Estelle Pearson: Award winning actuary and director of Finity Consulting with extensive experience in the insurance industry.

## Victoria to introduce licensing of disability workers, Premier announces

The Victorian Government will introduce an independent registration and accreditation scheme for disability workers, becoming the first jurisdiction in the country to commit to the regulatory regime. Premier Daniel Andrews said the scheme would protect people with a disability from harm and would ensure workers had "the right skills, experience and qualifications." ## <u>Transition from prison for people with intellectual disability: a qualitative study of service professionals</u>

Report by Jesse T. Young, Kate van Dooren, Fernanda Claudio, Craig Cumming, Nick Lennox for the Australian Institute of Criminology. People with intellectual disability face a range of challenges on their release from prison due both to their own needs and the complexity of the service delivery system, which can make effective service delivery difficult. This difficulty is exacerbated by the sometimes combative nature of relationships between service providers. These issues could be addressed, at least in part, by improved training and stricter guidelines for those working in the sector. Representatives of disability and justice-related agencies in Queensland and Western Australia were interviewed for this research. ## High Court of Australia rejected an appeal to have Auslan interpreter for jury service

The High Court of Australia unanimously rejected an appeal from Gaye L, a Queensland women who had been turned down for jury service because she requires as Auslan interpreter to participate in proceedings. "The decision is very disappointing", says peak national disability group, Disabled Persons Organisations Australia (DPO Australia). "However, we won't be deterred in our fight to ensure that people who are Deaf, or with disability, can access the justice system on an equal basis with other Australians," said Ngila Bevan, Co-CEO of People with Disability Australia and member of DPO Australia. ## **Un Committee Considers Participation Of Deaf People In Jury Duty**

Anyone can be asked to be on a jury, and decide if someone did a crime or not. But that is hard for people with disability. Many jury rooms are not accessible. Jurors who are deaf are not provided with Auslan interpreters, so they can't do it. And some people say you can't have extra people in the jury room, like interpreters. The United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD) says everyone should be able to do jobs like this, with support if needed. The Law Society has published an article on this. It discusses the problems of using Auslan interpreters in courts and for juries. It says people can use the UNCRPD to challenge the system. They gave the Disability Council NSW permission to publish the article. Download at JURY SERVICE

## **Australia's First National Guideline for Autism Diagnosis**

A major study has been launched to develop Australia's first national diagnostic guideline for autism led by The Cooperative Research Centre for Living with Autism (Autism CRC). NDIA Deputy Chief Executive Officer, Louise Glanville, said the Agency was committed to co-design and recognised the design of the Scheme must be informed by the lived experiences of participants and people with disability. "Working with Autism CRC provides the Agency with an opportunity to participate in an exceptional collaboration with the autism community, researchers, practitioners and service providers to improve the diagnosis and early identification and understanding of autism," Ms Glanville said. While access to the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) is not dependent on a diagnosis, the team will be working closely with the NDIA to ensure the guideline aligns with the processes for entry into the NDIS. ## Psychological Disability - Australian Bureau of Statistics Survey

2012 Australian Bureau of Statistics Survey of Disability, Ageing and Carers (SDAC). Psychological disability refers to people who reported:

- A nervous or emotional condition which causes restrictions in everyday activities that has lasted, or is expected to last for six months or more; or
- A mental illness for which help or supervision is required that has lasted, or is expected to last for six months
  or more; or
- A brain injury, including stroke, which results in a mental illness or nervous and emotional condition which causes restrictions in everyday activities.
- Of all people with any type of disability, 18.5% had a psychological disability.
- 3.4% of Australians (770,500 people) reported having a psychological disability, with similar rates for men and women. This was an increase from 2.8% (606,000 people) in 2009.
- Of those with a psychological disability, just over four in ten reported profound levels of core activity limitation, and a further two in ten severe core activity limitations.

It was also revealed that a wide range of long-term health conditions and impairments coexist with psychological disability

## Alcohol and other drug treatment services in Australia 2014-15

- In 2014-15, around 850 alcohol and other drug treatment services provided just over 170,000 treatment episodes to around 115,000 clients.
- The top 4 drugs that led clients to seek treatment were alcohol (38% of treatment episodes), cannabis (24%), amphetamines (20%) and heroin (6%).
- The proportion of episodes where clients were receiving treatment for amphetamines has continued to increase over the last 10 years, from 11% of treatment episodes in 2005-06 to 20% in 2014-15.
- The median age of clients in AOD treatment services is increasing, 33 years in 2014-15, up from 31 in 2005-06.

## Profile of specialised mental health care facilities

http://mhsa.aihw.gov.au/resources/facilities/

Specialised mental health care is delivered in and by a range of facilities in Australia including <u>public</u> and <u>private</u> psychiatric hospitals, <u>psychiatric units or wards in public acute hospitals</u>, <u>community mental health care services</u> and government-operated and non government-operated residential mental health services.

The information presented in this section is drawn primarily from the National Mental Health Establishments Database.

## **Key points**

- Specialised mental health services for admitted patients were provided by 159 public hospitals during 2013–14. These facilities employed nearly 14,000 full-time-equivalent staff, had 6,791 specialised mental health beds available, and provided care to admitted patients for over 2.1 million patient days. In addition, 63 private hospitals delivered specialised mental health services, providing 2,593 specialised mental health service beds.
- There were 2,427 residential mental health service beds available during 2013–14, with almost twothirds of the provided in government operated services.
- There were over 30,500 full-time-equivalent staff employed in state and territory specialised mental health care services in 2013–14, with over half of these (51%) being nurses. Nationally, this equates to 131 FTE staff per 100,000 population.
- Over the last 2 decades to 2013–14, the number of full-time-equivalent health care providers employed
  in public sector community mental health services increased from 3,358 in 1993–94 (or 19 per 100,000
  population) to 10,711 in 2013–14 (or 46 per 100,000 population), reaching around 41% of all staff across
  public sector specialised mental health services during 2013–14.

## Dementia set to become leading cause of death 'in the next few years'

Heart disease has been Australia's leading cause of death since the early 20th century but that could change as dementia death rates continue to rise, latest figures from the Australian Bureau of Statistics show.

## **Human Rights-based Approach to Disability - e-Learning**

The Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD) which entered into force in 2008, is a legally binding instrument which has been widely ratified. It is grounded in a human rights-based approach, moving away from previous models on how to approach disability, such as the medical model. This change is profound and is often recognized as a paradigm shift in the thinking of disability. Understanding the human rights-based approach to disability is key to ensuring that policy-makers and other stakeholders who work on issues affecting the rights of persons with disabilities, can design laws, policies and programmes, in a way that is consistent with the CRPD.

UNITAR, with the support of the Inter-Agency Support Group for the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (IASG), offers the e-learning course "The Human Rights-Based Approach to Disability", which provides a unique opportunity to understand the human rights-based approach and to learn how to apply it, as well as to understand core aspects of the CRPD, with a particular focus on anti-discrimination and participation. In addition, this course studies principles and standards deriving from the international human rights system reflecting on the experience acquired by UN Agencies, Civil Society Organizations and persons with disabilities themselves.

The overall objective of this course is to advance a better understanding of the human rights-based approach to disability and to enable participants to identify gaps between existing policy and the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, in order to implement it correctly.

The e-learning course will be comprised of the following four modules:

- Module 1: What is (and what is not) disability?
- Module 2: Introduction to the CRPD
- Module 3: Discrimination and anti-discrimination in the CRPD
- Module 4: Cross-cutting provisions in the CRPD
